Consultations already underway

- Libraries
- Voluntary and Community Sector

LEADER

- 30% of funding is eligible for community projects if they have an economic impact

Examples could be...

- Access to community ICT
- Community or Social enterprises to deliver local services
- Support for events linked to cultural or heritage activities
- Support for local tourism events / festivals

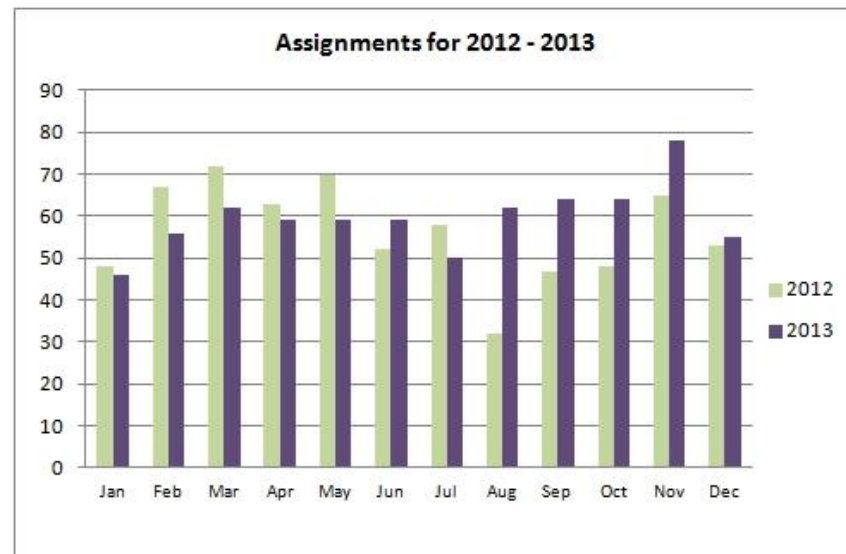

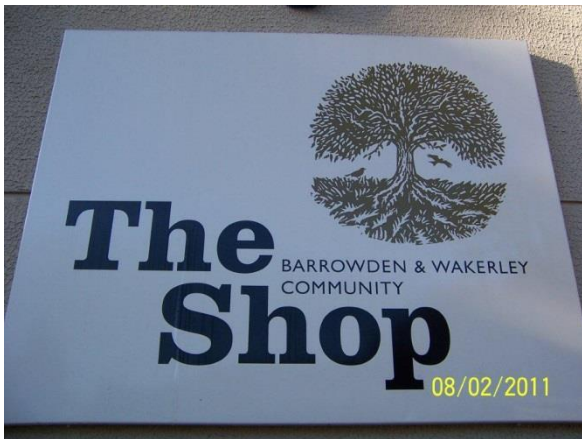
